At the end of the school day, visit the Swap Shop located in the school hall on Monday 20th January and choose items to rehome.

For those unable to attend after school, the Swap Shop will be open Tuesday 21st January at lunchtime in the Reception Classroom. This is for the pupils who could not attend the previous Swap Shop only.




RSPB Big Schools' Birdwatch

Fairtrade Fortnight

This year Fairtrade asked those taking part to focus on the cocoa farmers. The children learnt where cocoa comes from and why the farmers need a fair wage for their produce. We watched the journey from cocoa plant to plate. Each class researched a Fairtrade ingredient before using it in a recipe. The children took what they had made home to help them to remember to spread the word about the importance of Fairtrade.

Did you know...

It is estimated that each year 12 million tonnes of plastic enter our oceans, two thirds of this comes directly from land. (Eco-Schools Website)

At school we do our best to reduce plastic waste. We encourage all classes to reduce the use of and reuse single use plastic where possible. To start, we ask all classes to stop the use of glitter. Did you know glitter is a micro plastic? This means it is hard to get rid of and can be hazardous to marine life and the environment.
